

Papatūānuku

Kia ora! Last week we welcomed Isaac Seaton to our class! I want to acknowledge how proud I was to see everyone in Papatūānuku on the stage in the school show Thursday night. They all danced with such confidence and enthusiasm which was an absolute delight to watch and made me burst with pride. A huge thanks to all of the whanau for putting together such delightful costumes. Our class looked amazing.

Last Friday we enjoyed a SBS Starters session with our upcoming New Entrants. We introduced them to our phonics character Milo the Monkey and made some monkeys to remind us of the sound 'M' and 'm' make. This week we have been reading stories about Matariki. There are quite a few stories and legends teaching us about how the star cluster formed in the sky and what Matariki means to people. One story we read is called "The Seven Kites of Matariki" which prompted us to make our own kites just like the people in the story did. 
Hinemoana
